Some Comments On Passwords

Remember the days when a simple password was acceptable? Or, then again, you may not be old enough to remember! In any case, passwords are a part of our daily life as we navigate today's technology! No matter how carefully you have crafted your passwords, in all likelihood they are out there. Consider the breach at Equifax of 147 million Americans' public records! We tend not to hear about the smaller breaches- usually obtained through e-mail addresses. Bottomline-use the strongest possible password for every password you use!!!

The problem comes when we have multiple passwords, do not use strong passwords, and tend to sometimes forget one or more (by the way, our Shop folks cannot retrieve it for you). So, please consider the following suggestions:

- **1-** Use a Password Manager-do your research on this, but there are FREE ones that are quite simple and easy to use. These are absolutely memory savers!
- **2-** Make a paper copy of all your passwords and keep it safely hidden. Keep it current.
- 3- Update/change your passwords frequently. I could say monthly, but this is something you need to decide, which is solely dependent on your own "Risk tolerance" level.

 Make a note to do this task either on paper or electronic calendar!
- 4- Who do you want to have access to your passwords and for what purpose? For example, what if something happens to you. All your banking and investments are online, and you are no longer able to do this? You may need/want to alert someone where this is in case you

are incapacitated, and they need to take care of your affairs. They will also need the passwords to your Password Manager and your computer.

Finally, it cannot be over emphasized that passwordsare part of our daily lives-AND-our passwords need to be self-managed/monitored regularly.

- Did you replace your aging computer over the holidays or perhaps have an old one in a closet, basement or garage taking up valuable storage space? Consider donating it to the computer club. - The current Windows 10 version is 21H2 (OS Build 19044.1469).
- The current Windows 11 version is 21H2 (OS Build 22000.434).
- The current Mac operating system is Monterey iOS 12.2.
- The current iPad and iPhone operating system is iOS 15.3.
- To check your Windows version, type the word <u>Winver</u> in the bottom left search box (or magnifying glass) then click <u>Winver</u> in the choices list. If you need to update, type the word Update in the bottom left search box (or magnifying glass) then click Check for Updates in the choices list. On the next screen, click Check for Updates; do this even if it says you are up to date. Keep clicking Check for Updates as long as the updates keep coming in.
- Do not download the optional updates; they are not needed unless you have a specific driver problem.
- Since Windows 10 will be supported by Microsoft until October 2025, there is no need to update from Windows 10 to Windows 11 at this time. Give Microsoft time to work out the bugs and problems with their new operating system.

Why Does My Phone Keep Disconnecting from Wi-Fi? By "How-to-Geek" Joe Fedewa

Wi-Fi is something many people take for granted as always being there. It can be very frustrating when your phone seems to have issues staying connected. There are a lot of things that can cause that to happen.

The question of what's causing your phone to disconnect from Wi-Fi can be approached from a few angles. Is the fault with your phone, the router, or your internet connection itself? Let's try to find out which is causing your troubles.

1. The Internet is having Issues

Let's start at the simplest and most likely explanation ---- your internet is having some troubles. It's not our phone's fault. It's not even your router's fault, your internet provider is just having some problems.

What can you do about this? Unfortunately, not much. If your internet is down or having some intermittent issues, you're going to have to wait it out.

2. Your Router is Misbehaving

Okay, so it's not your internet provider. Let's go to the next line of defense----your Wi-Fi router. Like many devices in your home, sometimes a router can randomly start misbehaving. And just like those other devices in your home, a simple reboot can solve the problem. If that doesn't do the trick, there are signs of router problems you can check for. Is the router overly warn to the touch? Are

the cables all securely and firmly connected to the router and modem? These small things can cause the Wi-Fi to be unreliable.

3. Too Many Devices on Your Network

It's common nowadays to have dozens of devices in your home connected to Wi-Fi. Something that people don't often think about is routers can have limits to how many devices can be connected at once.

Microsoft Defender is the built-in anti-malware package that is included with modern Windows operating systems. It's alternatively known as Windows Security (it shows up under Settings as Windows Security) or Windows Defender (sometimes with Antivirus at the end of the name, as in this Microsoft Docs page). But whatever you want to call it, for many Windows users, this tool is the go-to default for handling security on their PCs.

As with Windows Update in general, sometimes Microsoft Defender updates may not work. Normally, Defender updates are handled as part of routine Windows update behavior, run on a daily basis as a scheduled task. But sometimes, Windows Update itself runs into problems and doesn't do much (or anything).

Should this happen, there are other ways to keep Defender updated, sidestepping any issues strictly related to Windows Update itself. Watch Out For This New Amazon Email Phishing Scam By How-To Geek Justin Duino

Scam artists are getting so good at creating realistic-looking phishing emails that some are getting past Gmail's spam filters. Although most of us have been trained to spot suspicious email messages, some (like the one above) look like they could be from companies like Amazon.


Bad actors posing as companies you do business with is nothing new. If you look at your spam folder right now, chances are that you'll see emails claiming to be from your cellphone carrier (T-Mobile, Verizon, AT&T, etc.) or a large retailer (Amazon, Best Buy, Target, etc.).

In this case, we received an authentic-looking email pretending to be a support ticket from Amazon. The message claims the company is having issues authorizing a purchase and needs us to re-enter our billing information. As this phishing attempt arrived leading up to the holiday shopping season, it's easy to see why someone might instinctually trust the email's legitimacy.

Thankfully, if a similar phishing email ends up in your inbox, there are a couple of easy ways to identify it as spam.

But before we dig into this particular phishing attack, know that we **DO NOT** recommend you open any email that you suspect to be spam or click on links found within the message. Instead, immediately report the email, mark it as spam, and delete the message.

The first thing you should always check before clicking or tapping links in an email is the sender's email address. Although the address can be spoofed, in our case, it wasn't. Combined with the sender's name appearing as "Donna Hughes's First Site" and odd spacing in the email's text, it's easy to tell something isn't quite right, but only if you slow down and look at the fine details first.




What's interesting/scary about this phishing attempt is that the bad actor is trying to steal multiple pieces of information in one attack. Once you click through the email to update your payment method, you're asked to sign in to your Amazon account. Although

this site might look like Amazon's website, it's not. You will find the completely incorrect URL at the top of the screen.

As you can see from the screenshots, we entered a false email address and password. Whoever created the scam is using this step to steal your Amazon credentials. Make sure you change your Amazon password if you ever entered it into a site like this.

We were then taken to a realistic Settings page that claimed we couldn't access our Amazon account until we updated our billing information. If we actually entered our information, the perpetrator would have our mailing address, phone number, and credit/debit card number.



The cherry on top of this entire scheme is the attempt to steal your login information for your email account. The fake website claims it wants to link your email to your Amazon account, but instead, you'd be giving whoever sent the message the keys to your private emails and possibly also your Google account.

To reiterate, you should never click on a link that you're suspicious of or think might be spam. And if you do, don't enter any personal or credit card information. Instead, close any tabs or windows that were opened, mark the message as spam, and permanently delete the email.

Be safe, and don't click on any links that appear even remotely insecure.


