Women's History Month. London-born Ada Lovelace (1815-1852) had a passion and gift for mathematics from a young age. She is credited with being the world's first computer programmer, as she drafted plans for how a machine called the Analytical Engine could perform computations. The machine, invented by her friend, mathematician, and inventor Charles Babbage, is considered to be the first general computer. Lovelace detailed applications for the Analytical Engine that relate to how computers are used today. Grace Hopper (Programmer for Harvard Mark I electromechanical computer), Katherine Johnson ("Hidden Figures"-Critical Space Calculations), Margaret Hamilton (Software Engineering-Apollo 11), Adele Goldberg (Graphical User Interfaces), Stephanie Shirley (Software Firm for Hiring Women), and Megan Smith (Net Neutrality and Tech Diversity) are more important women whose roles in Information Technology through the years allow computer science to thrive today.

- The current Windows 10 version is 21H2 (OS Build 19044.1526).
- The current Windows 11 version is 21H2 (OS Build 22000.493).
- The current Mac operating system is Monterey iOS 12.2.
- The current iPad and iPhone operating system is iOS 15.3.1
- To check your Windows version, type the word <u>Winver</u> in the bottom left search box (or magnifying glass) then click <u>Winver</u> in the choices list. If you need to update, type the word Update in the bottom left search box (or magnifying glass) then click Check for Updates in the choices list. On the next screen, click Check for Updates; do this even if it says you are up to date. Keep clicking Check for Updates as long as the updates keep coming in.
- Do not download the optional updates; they are not needed unless you have a specific driver problem.
- Since Windows 10 will be supported by Microsoft until October 2025, there is no need to update from Windows 10 to Windows 11 at this time. Give Microsoft time to work out the bugs and problems with their new operating system.

Apple's Tap to Pay Lets iPhones Accept Contactless Payments DAVE LECLAIR

Apple has unveiled a new feature that lets businesses take <u>iPhone-to-iPhone payments</u> without any additional hardware. This could be a game-changer for small businesses that need to accept credit cards.

"As more and more consumers are tapping to pay with digital wallets and credit cards, Tap to Pay on iPhone will provide businesses with a secure, private, and easy way to accept contactless payments and unlock new checkout experiences using the power, security, and convenience of iPhone," said Jennifer Bailey, Apple's vice president of Apple Pay and Apple Wallet in a <u>press release</u>.

The first company to get on board with Apple's new payment system is Stripe, which will start using it in Spring 2022. Apple said other companies would jump on later in 2022. The system will work with Apple Pay, contactless credit and debit cards, and other digital wallets through a simple tap to an iPhone.

For businesses who use companies like Stripe to process their credit cards, being able to take contactless payments right from an iPhone without any additional card readers could be a gamechanger, as it allows them to get out to where their customers are and take payments quickly and safely.

"Whether you're a salesperson at an internet-first retailer or an individual entrepreneur, you can soon accept contactless payments on a device that's already in your pocket: your iPhone," said Billy Alvarado, Stripe's chief business officer.

RELATEDHOW to Set Up and Use Apple Pay on an iPhone

As far as privacy and security goes, Apple says that "With Tap to Pay on iPhone, customers' payment data is protected by the same technology that makes Apple Pay private and secure." If you trust <u>Apple Pay</u> with your payments now, the same level of security will apply to this new feature.

How popular this is will depend on developers adopting it, as Apple is releasing it for them to use. Only time will tell how many payment processors decide to use Tap to Pay, but seeing as it's Apple pushing it, we'd expect it to catch on.

How to Manage App Permissions on Android JOE FEDEWA

Android permissions used to be a mess, but modern versions of Android have simplified them greatly. Now, you grant apps access to certain features as it needs them. You can also manually revoke permissions from any app.

You don't need to <u>root</u>, <u>install a custom ROM</u>, or switch to an iPhone to do this anymore. In fact, Android finally has the app permission system it should have had all along, <u>similar to the iPhone's system</u> (though still <u>room for improvement</u>). https://www.howtogeek.com/230683/how-to-manage-app-permissions-on-android-6.0/

Even as a techy person, I was guilty of using them at one time. It's understandable to think <u>closing</u> background apps would be a good thing, but we'll explain why it's not.

Intel CPUs Are Getting Mystery "Critical" Security Updates DAVE LECLAIR

Intel is about to announce a security issue with some of its CPUs. The company has released "critical" <u>CPU microcode</u> updates that fix an undisclosed severe security issue. They're rolling out to Linux systems, and updates for Windows PCs likely aren't far behind.

The updates, classified as "critical," were first spotted by Phoronix. Intel will likely provide more information soon and the microcode updates should make their way to Windows Update shortly, too. The details of the security flaw have not yet been publicly revealed.

As for which processors are affected, updates were discovered for Intel Whiskey Lake and Tiger Lake CPUs, though there could be others. We only know about the two discovered by Phoronix for sure. We'll have to wait for updates to release to the masses to find out exactly which chips have the vulnerability.

Even though the patch was spotted on Linux, the folks at Phoronix did its testing on a <u>Dell XPS</u> with Linux, but Dell issued "urgent" Windows firmware binaries for the same computer around

the same dates. Your PC manufacturer may provide fixes for your system, but hopefully, Microsoft will roll them out to all affected PCs soon.

Depending on the urgency, we could see the update pushed during the next <u>Patch Tuesday</u> in February 2022, or Windows could issue an Out of Band update to address them sooner.

What Is "Ethereum 2.0" and Will It Solve Crypto's Problems? BENJ EDWARDS

If you're not too familiar with Ethereum, you can conceptualize it by imagining a giant, distributed virtual computer running on the internet. Unlike a virtual machine running on a single PC, Ethereum is a distributed virtual machine made up of thousands of (called nodes) linked by a blockchain. These nodes can execute "smart contracts," which are programs that run on the Ethereum virtual computer. And since Ethereum is dynamic and distributed, the size of the virtual machine can shrink or grow at any time as nodes join or leave the network.

Payment in Ether (a cryptocurrency that runs as one of the applications on the Ethereum network) gives people the incentive to run these nodes and provide the computational power (known as "mining") to execute the smart contracts and verify the chronological order of transactions on the Ethereum blockchain. That verification process is called "consensus."

There are problems with Ethereum today. To understand the need for Ethereum's upgrade, you need to understand Ethereum's current drawbacks. Ethereum's architects and experts alike have pointed out a handful of main problems with how Ethereum works, and they generally regard these problems as standing in the way of wider growth of Ethereum applications.

Meet Chrome OS Flex, Google's new weapon for desktop domination By JR Raphael, Contributing Editor, Computerworld

Google's <u>Chrome OS</u> platform has come a ridiculously long way in an incredibly short time.

Back when it launched in 2010, Chrome OS truly was just a browser in a box — a dead-simple operating system designed to act as a portal to the web and not much more. The software had no desktop, no task bar, and barely even anything in the way of settings. It was essentially just a full-screen browser window — and that's it.

Fast-forward to 2022, and Chrome OS is a <u>fully featured and impressively polished</u> computing solution. Between the platform's ongoing expansion and the rapid evolution in how we all use computers, Chromebooks are now a genuinely <u>practical and often advantageous option</u> for business, personal, and education-related use.

The trick now for Google, particularly on the business front, is getting companies to give up the Windows habit and actually give Chrome OS a try.

Part of that challenge is closing the gaps with how some companies still approach computing. Plain and simple, while Chrome OS might be able to handle 95% of a typical organization's needs, lots of places still rely on legacy programs that operate only in the Windows environment. Firefox 97 Is Out, and It Removes a Bunch of Themes (Unless You Do This) DAVE LECLAIR

If you're a <u>Firefox</u> user, it's time to get excited because there's a new version of the browser available to <u>download</u> right now. Firefox 97 removes the colorway themes and adds Windows 11-style scrollbars to the browser (along with the usual set of fixes and tweaks).

RELATED <u>Try Firefox's Colorful New Theme System Before It's Gone</u>

The most significant change that made its way to Firefox 97 is the removal of the <u>colorway themes</u>, which were always meant to be available for a limited time. They were added in Firefox 94, so they made it through a few versions before being retired, as was the plan.

Thankfully, if you really like the colorway themes, you can keep your favorite one by having it enabled when the feature expires. You won't be able to switch between all 18 after that, but at least the theme you've enjoyed for the last couple of months will stick around.

Another notable change is that Firefox now supports the new style of scrollbars on Windows 11, which means the browser will blend in better with the rest of Microsoft's operating system. While the scrollbars didn't exactly break the browser experience, it's still nice to have it blend in a little better with the OS.

Mozilla also released some minor tweaks and fixes for its browser in Firefox 97. You can <u>download the latest version</u> of the browser right now and give it a try for yourself.

Mozilla Firefox Is Now a Better VPN Browser Than Chrome

Multi-Account Containers is one of Firefox's most remarkable features. It just got better, as you can now use it to connect Firefox VPN to multiple servers as you switch back and forth between accounts.

Firefox is taking a significant step ahead of other browsers in terms of <u>VPN functionality</u> by adding support for its <u>Multi-Account</u> <u>Containers</u> feature, as announced in a <u>blog post by Mozilla</u>. Having the ability to switch between VPN servers quickly makes Firefox a terrific browser option for anyone who regularly connects to a VPN (specifically, to Mozilla's VPN).



How OneDrive Works: the Very Basics Where to place your files and what OneDrive does with them.

OneDrive is a free, useful service. Learn the basics here. I want to understand the ramifications of copying files to OneDrive versus moving files to OneDrive.

I think a good way to answer your question is to review what OneDrive does, how it works, how it relates to the files on your <u>hard disk</u>, and how all that relates to "the <u>cloud</u>".

OneDrive Basics

OneDrive monitors a specific folder on your computer — C:\Users\<login id>\OneDrive — for files, folders, and changes. Items added or changes made are automatically uploaded to OneDrive.com cloud storage, where you can access them online. Files not within the OneDrive folder on your computer are not involved in OneDrive in any way.

Life without OneDrive


Without OneDrive, your files are stored on your computer in the folder(s) you select.

For example, you might have a document — I'll call it "example.docx" — in your Documents folder. On your hard drive, then, that file would live in the folder:

C:\Users\<login id>\Documents

And its full path would be

C:\Users\<login id>\Documents\example.docx



example.docx in the Documents folder. Click for larger image. (Screenshot: askleo.com)

Until you <u>back up</u> your machine or make a copy of this file some other way, that's the only place it lives; it's the one and only copy of your file.


OneDrive starts with files in a folder on your machine

OneDrive starts out the same way; just in a different folder. Say you put your example document in your OneDrive folder. On your hard drive, then, that file would live in the folder:

C:\Users\<login id>\OneDrive

And its full path would be

C:\Users\<login id>\OneDrive\example.docx

There's nothing really different about this. It's just a file in a folder... Until you have the OneDrive app running and are signed in to your Microsoft/OneDrive account.

OneDrive automatically copies to the cloud


Any file you put in your OneDrive folder is automatically copied to the OneDrive cloud servers and made available in your OneDrive account.

What that means is that shortly after

C:\Users\<login d>\OneDrive\example.docx

has been created, you'll find a copy of the file online in your OneDrive cloud storage. To create the account go to

The file now exists in both places —


- On your machine, in the OneDrive folder
- In the cloud, in your OneDrive.com account
- because you placed the file in your OneDrive folder on your machine.

OneDrive counts subfolders

Let's say you have many files and folders and sub-folders full of documents and more. As long as they're "underneath" the OneDrive folder on your machine, they're "in" OneDrive. For example:

C:\Users\<login id>**OneDrive**\Project1\Support Documents\Excuses\reasons-we-fail.docx

is "in" OneDrive, because it exists within, or "underneath" the OneDrive folder. That means that all the subfolders and all the files underneath the OneDrive folder are also automatically uploaded to your OneDrive account online.

All because you placed those files anywhere within your OneDrive folder.

Files elsewhere are unaffected

Only files within the OneDrive folder are managed by OneDrive. What this means is that our original example:

C:\Users\<login id>\Documents\example.docx is not within the OneDrive folder, and thus is not affected by and has nothing to do with OneDrive. OneDrive is nowhere in its path. It's just a file on your machine, and nothing more. Now we can get to your answer.

Copying a file to OneDrive

Copying creates a duplicate of the original file.

So if we start with our example:

C:\Users\<login id>\Documents\example.docx and copy it to OneDrive:

C:\Users\<login id>\OneDrive\example.docx

Then there are now two copies of the file: one within OneDrive, and one not.

Related: Beware: Microsoft can really, and I mean really, set things up so that "Documents" is very confusing. The "Documents" I'm talking about is "C:\Users\<login id>\Documents". To understand the confusion, see: Why Is My OneDrive Full?

In addition, after the copy is put into the OneDrive folder, OneDrive notices the new file and uploads it to OneDrive.com online.

There are now three copies of the file:

- One in Documents, on your machine.
- One in OneDrive, on your machine.
- One in OneDrive.com, online.

If you delete or change the file in Documents, it will have no effect on the file on OneDrive, as they are completely separate files. Similarly, if you delete or change the file in OneDrive, it will have no

effect on the file in Documents for the same reason. By moving, we are simply changing the location of a file on your hard disk.

Once again starting with our example:

C:\Users\<login id>\Documents\example.docx if we move it to OneDrive:

C:\Users\<login id>**OneDrive**\example.docx

Then there is only one copy of the file on your hard disk: within OneDrive. Moving just changed its location.

In addition, after the move is made, OneDrive notices the file and uploads it to OneDrive.com online.

OneDrive synchronization

One feature of OneDrive I've not yet talked about is synchronization. It is simply this:

• If a file within your OneDrive folder changes or is deleted, it is uploaded to or deleted from your OneDrive.com online.4

This is one of the reasons I sometimes refer to <u>OneDrive as "nearly continuous backup"</u>. Every time you hit "save" on any document that is stored anywhere in the OneDrive folder on your machine, the saved file is then also uploaded to the cloud.

Perhaps as important in terms of your question, this is *not* true for any files or folders that are *not* within your OneDrive folder.

There's more to OneDrive

OneDrive has many more features than what I've described above, but understanding this fundamental function is enough to begin putting it to use. With that under your belt, you'll be able to explore what more you can do.

Do this

Take a few minutes to understand the basics of OneDrive. Consider using it for at least a minimal amount of near-real-time <u>backup</u>. It's free and it's useful. You don't have to explore or understand its more complex features.

Is it a good idea to use OneDrive?

I believe it's a very good idea to use OneDrive, even at its most basic, as a form of almost real-time backup. As a bonus, the backup is independent of your location, and you can access it from anywhere.

What are the disadvantages of using OneDrive?

There are few disadvantages to using OneDrive. If you have a slow internet connection, it might be slow itself or cause other activities to slow down as it synchronizes files. As long as you maintain basic security on your Microsoft account, there's really no reason to avoid it.

How do I transfer files to OneDrive?

The easiest way to transfer files to OneDrive is to install or enable OneDrive on your computer and then copy or move files into the OneDrive folder. They'll be automatically uploaded to the cloud. Alternately, you can visit OneDrive.com on the web, sign in with your Microsoft account, and upload there.






